Dear Friends

I'm grateful for this opportunity to write for Circuit Chat. I expect that many of you will know that I am a supernumerary (retired!) minister living in Retford where I am working two days a week to support Julie at The Grove and Hallcroft churches. I'm also looking forward to meeting people elsewhere in the circuit through taking Sunday services on the Plan.

It was suggested to me that there might be some reference to Christmas in my letter since this edition of Circuit Chat covers November and December. It seems a bit early to be writing about Christmas in October although 'Home Bargains' in Retford has been decorated for Christmas since August! You are probably familiar with the



apocryphal story of King Canute who is supposed to have tried to stop the incoming tide and he is sometimes referred to in situations where someone is trying to prevent the inevitable from happening. For many years in my ministry, I was a bit like King Canute in relation to Christmas – not that I tried to stop it altogether (that would make me more like Scrooge than King Canute!) but inasmuch as I tried to make the most of the Advent season without rushing too quickly into Christmas. However, I never went quite as far as a


former Anglican colleague who wouldn't have carols sung in his church until midnight on Christmas Eve! Whilst I regret the tendency in our society – and to

some extent in the Church – to start Christmas earlier each year, I've realised that sometimes you just have to go with the flow instead of trying to stop the tide! That said, I do hope that we can see the value of observing Advent as a season in its own right and not overlook Advent in our haste to get to Christmas. One way in which we can do that is to set aside some time for quiet reflection in what is a busy time of year and the 'Advent Reflections' taking place at The Grove (and perhaps similar things elsewhere in the circuit) give us an opportunity to do that.

The Methodist Church's theme for Advent and Christmas this year is 'Out of the ordinary' and there are lots of resources on the Methodist Church website for engaging with this theme in our churches and communities. As I write I am mindful that for many ordinary people at this time life is far from ordinary – for those in Israel and Gaza affected by unimaginable violence and cruelty and, more locally, for people affected by the recent floods. The coming of Jesus into the world is a reminder of how God acts in extraordinary ways but at the same time works through ordinary people and situations to show his extraordinary love and compassion. I wonder how things are for you just now. Do you feel that life is very ordinary or are there things going on – either good or bad – which make life seem extraordinary? However things are for us, the good news is that God is with us and we cannot be separated from God's love for us. As in the coming weeks we hear again the very familiar story of Christ's birth I pray that we will be touched afresh by the extraordinary love of God shown to us in Jesus and that we may find opportunities to share that extraordinary love through our churches and in our communities.



Drunk with fatigue; deaf even to the hoots
Of gas-shells dropping softly behind.

Gas! GAS! Quick, boys! —An ecstasy of fumbling Fitting the clumsy helmets just in time, But someone still was yelling out and stumbling.

And flound'ring like a man in fire or lime. —
Dim through the misty panes and thick green light,
As under a green sea, I saw him drowning.
In all my dreams before my helpless sight,
He plunges at me, guttering, choking, drowning.



If in some smothering dreams, you too could pace
Behind the wagon that we flung him in,
And watch the white eyes writhing in his face,
His hanging face, like a devil's sick of sin;
If you could hear, at every jolt, the blood.
Come gargling from the froth-corrupted lungs,
Obscene as cancer, bitter as the cud
Of vile, incurable sores on innocent tongues,—
My friend, you would not tell with such high zest
To children ardent for some desperate glory,

Presidential Reflections

October 2023

The month of September has been a busy one, as is so often the case when the Connexional year begins again! Having shared in all the Welcome Services in the district, I headed for London where on the first Sunday in the month, I was privileged to preach at Wesley's Chapel and Leysian Mission at their morning worship. The

Vice President and I were then able to share in an International Lunch, cooked by members of the culturally diverse congregation and then we had opportunity to look around John Wesley's House and the museum that are on the same site.

In the evening, the Vice President and I led worship at Methodist Central Hall, Westminster, with Kerry preaching and me presiding at the healing communion service.

We stayed over in London on Sunday night and then on Monday met with representatives from All We Can for lunch and shared an interesting conversation about their work and the resonances between the Presidential theme of "Hidden Treasures" and all that they are seeking to do in working with communities overseas. Later in the afternoon we spent time filming at Methodist Central Hall, for a video that was released a few days later to mark the start of the Connexional year.

The following day we travelled from London to Manchester to speak at the annual new Connexional year



service at Central Buildings, Manchester. Both the Vice President and I were invited to speak during this act of worship attended by staff from Central Buildings and TMCP and a good number of ecumenical and inter-faith partners. The worship was followed by a buffet lunch, a meeting with TMCP staff and a tour of the buildings with the ministry team, Revd Ian Rutherford, Deacon Jenny Jones, and Karen Attaway. It was inspiring to see and hear about the mission being exercised in and from the building and to see the Presidential theme picked up in displays around the premises.

Later that week, I was engaged in a few online meetings in preparation for commitments later in the month and then on Sunday 10th September, I was present at Sidedoor Methodist Church in Grimsby. Here I was privileged to induct the new Youth President, Tom Hart and to preside at Holy Communion in a wonderful service where our singing was accompanied by the Methodist Youth Brass Band and the sermon was preached by Revd Jade Bath.

During the week that followed I was in London again, this time to preach at the Annual Dedication Service held during the Methodist Independent Schools Trust (MIST) Conference at the Royal Foundation of St Katherine's. The Conference is attended by head teachers, governors, and trustees so it was good to attend one of their conference sessions in which they explored some of their plans and also engage in conversation with them over lunch.

During the week beginning Monday 25th September I spent three days at Bulford Barracks, near Andover, with the British Army! I was hosted by Assistant Chaplain General, Revd Richard Smith, with whom I trained at Wesley College in Bristol, so it was good to connect with him again. During the three days, I met with the Chaplain General and Deputy Chaplain General to hear about the role of chaplains and particularly Methodist chaplains within the army. I met with Army chaplains both informally and in a time of prayer of worship, visited the Garrison churches at Bulford, Tidworth and Larkhill and learned more about how the Welfare Teams operate within the Army. I also spent an afternoon on Salisbury Plain talking with and offering support to soldiers who were engaged in a practice exercise lasting several weeks and on the final day visited the Defence Academy where chaplains are trained as well as the Chaplaincy Museum, both in Shrivenham.

After just one night at home, it was then off to the Lancashire District for the final visit this month. On Friday afternoon I had a glorious time at St John's CofE/Methodist School in Brinscall, meeting with the Shining Flames, a group of children who help to lead worship in the school and then offering some input to the regular Friday afternoon worship at the school attended by parents and families as well as the children. The highlight of the afternoon was hearing some of the children perform a song called Hidden Treasures, composed by District Chair, Revd Phil Gough – a wonderful surprise.

From there we travelled to Trinity URC/Methodist Church in Great Harwood, Blackburn where I shared afternoon tea with a gathering of supernumerary ministers and shared with them the way in which the Vice President and I had discerned our theme for the year.

On Saturday 30th, I was invited to lead a Bible Encounter event on the Presidential theme at Leyland Methodist Church, Preston. About 40 people from across the district engaged in biblical reflection and enthusiastic conversation and I came away with many things to continue to reflect upon as our theme is developed during the year. After that, I was privileged to share lunch with some District officers at The Mill, a wonderful eating establishment in the grounds of St Catherine's Hospice before dropping into the end of Godly Play training that had been taking place at Ingol Methodist Church in Preston.



The evening was spent at the Chair's manse, sharing in a meal and conversation with some of the younger ministers in the district and exploring the challenges and opportunities of ministry as they see them.

The final day was full of opportunities to lead worship and preach. On Sunday morning I was in a familiar place – Leslie's home church – at Torrisholme Methodist Church in Morecambe for Harvest celebrations followed by a lovely buffet lunch. From there I travelled to Lytham Methodist Church in the Blackpool and South Fylde Circuit for a Circuit service at 3.00 p.m. in which each church in the circuit shared something of the treasure they have discovered in their context. Then finally, I preached at the weekly district gathering for worship on zoom!

It's been a very busy but wonderful September, and I can't believe that 3 months has already passed since my induction at the Conference. President and Vice-President update on the situation in the Middle East

We pray......You call us, again and again, in times of conflict and destruction, to be attentive to those who are most vulnerable. Give us the compassion to weep with those who weep and mourn with those who mourn.

As deaths and injuries of civilians continue to rise in the Israel-Hamas conflict, we are heartbroken to see the devastation this is having on so many people living in the region. We believe in a God who weeps, and, alongside the Holy Spirit our Comforter, our hearts are breaking with all those whose loved ones have had their lives brutally cut short, for the terror felt by Israeli families, and the unimaginable

wait that many face for news of the people being held hostage. We watch in horror as Gazan civilians flee for their lives, unable to leave Gaza and trapped in the midst of a violent and unpredictable conflict.



The situation may feel overwhelming, so much information, so much misinformation and so much misery. Where is our hope? Watching and reading news reports can leave us confused and feeling helpless. What can we do? As members of the Methodist Church, we have witnessed the plight of the Palestinian people's oppression for many years and have sought to

encourage those on all sides who are working for lasting peace with justice in the region.

Now we pray for all those people and groups we have met: Daoud Nasser from the Tent of Nations and the recipient of the World Methodist Peace Prize in 2018; Rabbi Nava Hefetz from Rabbis for Human Rights, the Wi'am Peace and Reconciliation Centre in Bethlehem; the staff of the Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme for Palestine and Israel, and the countless people and families in Gaza and the West

Bank who we, as a Church, have supported over the years. We uphold them, praying for their safety, asking for God's protection and comfort. And we pray for those who have the power to effect change – that they will use this privilege wisely and well to put a swift end to this violence and aggression. We undertake to continue to pray that the beautiful peace of the Prince of Peace will manifest in our world, and we pledge ourselves once again



to respond to the Gospel of God's love in Christ and to live out this discipleship in our worship and mission.



We call on the UK Government to do all it can to encourage dialogue between Israel, the Palestinian Authority, Egypt and states in the wider region. We urge our Government to use its influence to end the siege of Gaza that is depriving its population of water and food, and to call on all parties to abide by international humanitarian law.

As well as praying, we ask you to consider doing the following:

- Supporting <u>Christian Aid's appeal</u> and/or signing a petition calling on the UK Government to establish safe routes out of Gaza for people left homeless or caught up in the violence
- Find out more about the situation: Resources for studying theological issues relating to Israel-Palestine
- Write to your MP to ask them to act to protect civilians in Gaza and to support a lasting peace
- Be generous to those who you may not agree with and try to find common ground. Pray for those people and, if appropriate, pray together. Be aware of those in your church or community who are particularly impacted by this situation, whether they have a connection with Israel or Palestine or because this is a painful and traumatic reminder of their own experiences of conflict. And please pray for those in leadership who are being called to offer support to the people who are impacted by the ongoing situation.




"All Good Gifts around us are sent from Heaven above".






My favorite holiday destination is Marcelli. This is a small unspoiled resort on the Adriatic coast of Italy.

Mission for Seafarers

For many years, Doris Maw at The Grove has coordinated woolly hats being knitted and then sent off to the Mission to Seafarers. Many people have supported this work and Doris has regularly sent off parcels.

The Mission to Seafarers is a mission society of the Anglican Communion which offers help and support to merchant seafarers. The charity provides its services through the chaplains that it appoints to port centres in over 50 countries. Ship visitors supported by volunteers, are able



to give free advice about employment issues or personal problems, as well as offer help in maritime emergencies.

You can define a seafarer as literally being someone who is employed to serve aboard any type of marine vessel. This usually refers to active seafaring workers but can be used to describe a person with a long history of serving within the profession.

This may sound like a simple definition, but delving further into the profession will reveal a plethora of service types and roles that individual seafarers can play in their line of work.

The work that seafarers do is often under-appreciated by the majority, and their working conditions vary.

Double Knit Hat Pattern




Regardless of your skill level, we appreciate the efforts of anyone who take the time to contribute to our charitable efforts. So please feel free to follow the steps outlined below:

- · Double knit or 4 ply wool
- Size 8 (4mm) Needles
- 2 oz of wool
- Cast on 120 stitches.
- Rib (2 plain 2 purl) for 12 inches
- Next Row Knit 2 together to end of the row Purl next row.
- Repeat these two rows once more.
- Knit 1 row.
- Purl 1 row.
- Pull thread through all stitches and sew up seam.

We have been asked if the crown of the hat could be a lighter colour so it can be seen in the helm of the boat.

Domestic Abuse Seminar (online)

STOP DOMESTIC ABUSE





Domestic abuse is widespread. It continues to affect people from all walks of life, including churchgoers and those with whom we came into contact through our activities.

It can be hard to believe that domestic abuse happens within Church, but research, conducted by Restored, devastatingly shows that 1 in 4 churchgoers have experienced abuse in a current relationship.

The Methodist Church holds that domestic abuse in all its forms is unacceptable and incompatible with the Christian faith and a Christian way of living. This means ensuring that members of the Methodist Church have an awareness and understanding of domestic abuse and know how to respond appropriately and effectively. Then when victims disclose abuse, they can expect to be listened to, taken seriously, supported and referred to local professional services, as appropriate.

Speakers:

Bekah Legg, CEO of Restored; A Christian charity whose mission is to speak up about the realities of violence against woman and girls, and to equip the church to stand against domestic abuse and support survivors.

Bekah will introduce the subject and provide an overview of the current situation in this country. **Karen Allen – Connexional Safeguarding Team** and Chair of the Methodist Church Domestic Abuse Planning Group, helped to produce the domestic abuse policy and procedures. She has worked with both adult and child survivors of domestic abuse offering practical and emotional support and providing a range of therapeutic interventions.

Karen will outline Methodist resources and Connexional DA policy, both devised to help and guide local churches.

Kerry Griffiths, training lead from IDAS: the largest specialist charity in the North supporting people affected by domestic abuse and sexual violence. IDAS support is open to anyone irrespective of age, sex, gender, ethnicity, disability, or immigration status.

Kerry will explain who IDAS are, what they do, and talk about some of the local groups they work with.

The Boys' Brigade was the first voluntary uniformed youth movement in the world and many of today's organisations for young people can trace their roots back through history to the Boys' Brigade.

The Boys' Brigade was founded in Glasgow on 4th October 1883 by Sir William Alexander Smith. From this one company formed in Scotland the Boys' Brigade has grown into a worldwide movement, having worked with millions of children and young people over 140 years.

In their centenary year, 1983, a Boys' Brigade company was formed at Carlton-in-Lindrick Methodist Church. The founding officers were Harold Marshall, Stuart and Liz MacFarlane, and Eddie Croot, and the first chaplain was Rev Graham McIntosh. There have been a number of long-serving instructors and helpers over the years. The company became the 1st Carlton-in-Lindrick Company and part of Sheffield Battalion in 1984.

On 1st October we held a Thanksgiving Service to celebrate the 40th Anniversary of our company, which since September 2022 has been the 1st Carlton-in-Lindrick Boys' Brigade and Girls Association. The worship was led by our chaplain, Rev Alan Hindmarch. There were over 50 people present, including some of our current boys, girls and leaders. There were also past leaders, helpers, friends, families and boys, and we welcomed visitors from Lincoln, Leeds, Leicester, Bristol and even Brisbane, Australia, as one of our former members happened to be home visiting family. The first company section leader, Stuart MacFarlane, played the organ for the service, and one of his daughters, now a local preacher in Leeds, led the prayers.

The Boy's Brigade has always been a Christian organisation, and each week has involved a 'spiritual section'. As technology has evolved, we have now moved from reading Bible stories to watching them as cartoon-style videos, and during the service we watched three stories and joined in singing 'The wise man built his house upon a rock.' At the end we sang the BB Vesper, originally written by Liz MacFarlane as the Anchor Boy Vesper, but still sung every week. It was played on the piano by Andrei, one of our current members.

Some who could not be present sent messages and memories, and much reminiscing was done over a buffet lunch afterwards, aided by a PowerPoint presentation of photographs on the screen.


On Tuesday 3rd October, the company had a party with games and food.

There are activities for children (& adults) to enjoy and take home.


