Fourteen of our Fellowship ladies arrived in the pouring rain.

We were a little daunted, but the rain stopped and the sunshine returned.

Our hosts, Pam and Butch Barnsdale, members of the National Gardening Scheme, welcomed us with a smile and introductory details of the grounds.

Bolham Manor was built in around 1800 in the hamlet of Bolham. The garden was terraced and there are caves at the very bottom, covered by trees and bushes.

A lovely picture of the house is on display in the Bassetlaw Museum in Grove Street.

A gravel path led us on our tour. A huge Handkerchief Tree was in full bloom. A golden Acer and various topiary features. A wicker sculpture completed the scene.



A huge ash tree, hundreds of years old, held many secrets. The pond, with a fountain and huge carp named Wilfred and Einstein, were swimming around.

Clematis and Honey suckle, as well as Bamboo bushes were everywhere to be seen.

Deutzia, ferns and Rhododendrons were all out in abundance. Campanula and Alliums were all in full

colour. A huge pear tree, in the orchard was festooned with delicate pink rambling roses.

We ended on the terrace by a cannon and a mill stone, holding many secrets.

Cake and tea were served in the kitchen. It really was a lovely afternoon and wellworth a visit.

All proceeds were passed on to charity by the hosts.

Eventually everything was completed and the first service in the sanctuary included a presentation about the history and mission of the church by members of the Retford Little Theatre. The Art Exhibition and Charter Day took place and when we welcomed people to the Circuit service it was 100% finished.

Members of The Grove are delighted with the renovations and look forward to sharing the space with the local community as our new performance area offers opportunities for a variety of drama, dance and music events.

Over the years, what I found was missing was experience and feeling and, as my spirituality changed, I wanted to include more and more meditative elements into my worship. Some people do not feel comfortable in traditional worship and may find these services speak to them and their spirituality. The services include silence, Taize music and chants and a guided meditation. Everyone is welcome.

"Living with Cancer"

One of Hannah Dunnett's prints "Trust in God" has on the sail of a boat being tossed on rough seas the words "*Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see.*"

Cancer does seem like the uninvited guest, sneaking in the back door, you're unaware of its presence, until it has its feet well and truly under the table. Phil's diagnosis started with a lump in his neck, which we thought was probably linked to recent treatment of another existing condition. From that first visit to the Drs at the end of Sept 2023 we did not know what the coming months would bring. Those who have walked the same path as us will know all too well how this feels. Phils treatment began 5th February a week before Lent began. Entering a personal wilderness, a place where God's presence and strength reached me through the prayers of so many people. I am not ashamed to confess I couldn't pray for me and Phil as I do so easily for others. God spoke to us through the cards, texts and emails that we felt so humbled to receive. We had been warned that treatment would be brutal, 35 sessions of radiotherapy every day Monday – Friday for 7 weeks. The mask he wore for it looked like something from a sci-fi movie.

At week 3 I found myself suddenly fulltime carer. I thanked God that I had been able to reduce my hours to part time two years before. God had walked before me, he was now with us both in the present, in a place that only God knew what we felt, feared and needed. We did not have celestial Angels tending to us, but we had Angels without wings in the nurses, doctors, consultants and all those who rang, texted, emailed and sent cards and left unexpected gifts. One was a plant which was waiting as I returned in the dark one evening after leaving a very ill Phil in hospital. I cried in the knowledge I was not alone.

When Phil was hospitalised on the ward we were brought into the lives of so many others in similar situations. The conversations we had humbled us in that Phil's diagnosis was so much more positive than many. I know all too well that there are so many children that walk this path too so bravely. Treatment finished the Friday before Palm Sunday and Phil rang the bell to mark the end of his treatment on Friday 22nd March, our wedding anniversary. Everyone cheered and clapped, familiar faces we had seen everyday had become unknown friends all sharing this milestone with Phil. I reflected as I prepared Palm Sunday services, it was like the shouts of acclamation of Palm Sunday. Tuesday, of Holy week saw the final attempt at his nasal feeding tube a success and we got home at 10pm at last. Less than 12 hours later though we were back because his tube was blocked. He finally came home Maundy

Thursday late afternoon. Good Friday I looked on at the man I loved suffering so much and being so brave. I reflected, was this how Mary felt watching her beloved Jesus suffer on Good Friday? I was now nurse, recording and giving a cocktail of medicines and feeds. As congregations journeyed from the joy of Palm Sunday, to the emotions of Holy week, to the joy and celebration of the Risen Christ on Easter morning we realised we had taken our own personal journey through Lent and Holy week too.

As I write this at the start of June I smile as from my study I can hear one of our 4 year old Granddaughters playing a game with her Grandad. I smile, what a joy to see Phil gradually with each passing day improving. God is good, and will never forsake us. We now await a PET scan and MRI to find out it we have evicted the uninvited guest.

Sincerely from our hearts, we thank everyone for their support.
